**Welcome to the Board Meeting of February 11, 2013 of the Incorporated Village of Sea Cliff.**

Congratulations to our Senior Outreach Worker, Karen Montagnese, and to Tracy Warzer for a very successful Senior Volunteer Fair at the Creative Arts Studio on January 15. The Fair was a first step in a new program Karen has developed to involve seniors in helping seniors.

I encourage residents to stop by at the Village Museum on a Sunday afternoon from 2 – 5 p.m. to see the new exhibit, “Architectural Details...Ceilings, Floors, Windows and Doors”. The exhibit features photos of vintage Sea Cliff architecture from the past and present as well as a newly restored model of Connor Cottage, the Victorian house across the street from the Woodshed. The exhibit includes a photographic documentation entitled “Gone But Not Forgotten” that focuses on the significant historical architecture we have already lost. The Museum hopes to contribute to discussion in the Village about the importance of preserving what we still have of our unique architectural history.

We have sent out and published a Request for Proposals (RFP) to operate the Beach Concession. If anyone is interested in presenting a proposal or knows someone who might be interested, please call John Mirando at Village Hall.

We are also beginning our search for lifeguards, especially those who are still in high school, so if you know anyone who is interested, have them call Marianne Lennon at Village Hall. Lifeguards must be at least 16 years of age by the start of the season and must obtain both pool and bay certification. Now is the time for those who are interested to sign up for the certification courses so talk to anyone you know who might want to have a great job for the summer.

Look for two informative articles in the upcoming March Village Bulletin. One announces a Nassau County Conservation District sale of trees and shrubs to help homeowners replace what they might have lost during Hurricane Sandy. The prices are very reasonable (from \$12 - \$22 for a bundle of 10 plants!) and there is a wide selection of trees that are native species that will hold up to storms and not interfere with power lines. You may order online with a deadline of March 10 and orders must be picked up on April 19 and 20 at the District Office at 5 Old Jericho Turnpike in Jericho. The other article is about how to deal with the ivy that is choking so many trees in Sea Cliff and making them more vulnerable to storm damage.

**Public Works Report – John Mirando**

During the month of January 2013, the Department of Public Works disposed of the following MSW:

- 222.23 tons of MSW
- 23.31 tons of Commingled Cans & Glass
- 14.75 tons of Newspaper & Cardboard
- 14.13 tons of C & D
- 3.94 tons of Metal
- 143.55 tons of yard waste
- 15 yards of street sweepings

For the month of January 14.6 % of the municipal waste stream was recycled; this is up by 3% over the last two months and more typical of what we had been achieving.
