### Mayor's Update

I, along with Trustee Pinto, attended the New York Conference of Mayors Winter Legislative Meeting in Albany on February 6 and 7. The agenda was robust and incredibly educational. It was an opportunity to connect with other mayors from both large and small municipalities and learn that the challenges we face are not unique. Traffic, speeding, and pedestrian safety came up frequently. These issues impact the quality of life in Sea Cliff in the same way they do a small village in western New York.

Climate impacts were the topic of two different breakout sessions. There was a session on recruiting and retaining good employees, and one discussing the future of an all-volunteer Fire Department when housing costs are driving volunteers from our communities. These are all issues that our Board of Trustees deals with daily.

We were fortunate to hear from Lieutenant Governor Antonio Delgado, who offered a unique perspective gained from both his current position and his three years as U.S. Representative to Congress representing the Congressional District of New York. He touched upon how difficult it was, in a district that was almost the size of Connecticut and Rhode Island combined, to keep in touch with the needs of his constituents. But the thing I found so compelling was when Delgado spoke of the "disconnected constituent," and how dangerous it is when people become so distrusting of government that they stop participating. In his view, it is dangerous for the health of our democracy when people stop caring enough to have an opinion and give voice to it. This message resonated with me in light of our Long Range Planning process, and the need for our residents to participate in the planning for the future vision of

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### Village Election 2023

#### Mayoral Candidate Elena Villafane



Once again, I come before the voters of Sea Cliff and ask for your confidence and vour vote as I seek reelection to a second term as Mayor of our beautiful village. When I look back over the last two years, I am proud of how much has been accomplished and humbled by what still needs to be done. In asking for your vote, I am committing to the voters of Sea Cliff to keep working on the never-ending "To Do" list that is at the core of municipal government.

Over the last two years, working with an incredibly talented group of Trustees and the commitment of a dedicated village staff, we have resumed in-person meetings; placed a new ambulance in service; purchased the former water department property; installed a new playground at the beach; enabled a social media presence on Facebook to further communicate with our residents; opted out of the marijuana legislation; completed the renovation of village hall offices; recaptured unused space to create a Mayor's Office; completed a facelift on the Public Works facility; completed a significant road improvement project; finalized the sewer lines on 7th Avenue and Maple Avenue; right-sized our vehicle fleet as part of our continuing effort toward achieving designation as a Climate Smart

Community; contracted for

an LED lighting program; investigated and applied for numerous grant opportunities, including New York Forward for the redevelopment of Glen Cove Avenue; realigned the Village organizational chart; completed the initial process for rebuilding the sea wall at the bottom of Tilley Place; facilitated Youth Activity Board events and adopted numerous pieces of legislation. This list is not exhaustive and does not capture the day-to-day activities that encompass village operations, nor does it address ongoing projects such as 325 Prospect and planning for the

We face uncertain economic times with interest rates rising and a sluggish real estate market. As we navigate the future, local government faces an extraordinary challenge from Governor Hochul's "Housing Compact," which has been introduced as part of the Governor's Budget. While local government recognizes the need for housing opportunities at all economic levels, it is local government - not state government - that is best positioned to answer that need in the best possible way for its community. This is an issue I and the Board have seen on the horizon and one of the many reasons we have advocated and implemented the Long Range Planning initiative.

So, as you can see, there is still much to be done and I am asking for your continued trust that I will use my education, professional experience and the knowledge I have developed in 11 years of public service to continue to serve the residents of Sea Cliff.

#### The Water Authority of North Shore

Many have been asking about the water situation in our community. Sea Cliff and parts of five other surrounding communities (Glen Cove, Brookville, Roslyn Harbor, and large parts of Glen Head and Glenwood Landing) have always had private water dating back to before the incorporation of Sea Cliff. This water district is known as the Sea Cliff Water District. Over the last few years, our water services have been sold between multinational corporations and Liberty is currently the provider of our community's water services

Due to numerous complaints related to water rates and services, the state legislature – led by Assemblyman Charles Lavine and former Senator James Gaughran – created the Water Authority of North Shore. The Authority was formed in 2022 with six

members appointed by our local governments (one each from the villages of Sea Cliff, Roslyn Harbor, Brookville, one from the City of Glen Cove and two from the Town of Oyster Bay). The Authority commenced meetings in May of 2022 and has begun preliminary discussions with Liberty on the municipalization of the water supply for the Sea Cliff Water District. The Authority has also retained the services of the second largest water supplier in New York State (the Suffolk County Water Authority) to assist in this process.

Please know that municipalization will take time because the Authority and Liberty must negotiate the value of the water district (i.e., the wells, towers, water infrastructure, etc.), come to terms on a sale price, and then coordinate the transition of the private water company

operations to the municipal entity. The Authority board (on which I sit as the Sea Cliff representative) hopes to continue to have movement on this process in 2023. Please know that until municipalization is complete, the Authority does not set water rates or run the system.

The Authority has created a website where you can keep up-to-date on information involving this very important issue for the community. The website can be found at www. wanorthshoreny.gov.

The community is encouraged to attend Authority monthly board meetings, which are open to the public, and to report issues involving water services or questions to the Authority via the website. Meeting dates, times and locations are posted on the Authority website.

#### Lighting the Way

We are in the home stretch of the LED street light upgrade. This is not just a simple swap out of light fixtures, but a complete assessment of the existing streetlights and a comprehensive evaluation of what is appropriate. We had a professional investment grade audit completed with respect to locations, light color, intensity, and light spread. Our goal is to have proper street and sidewalk lighting while also minimizing the light spread onto private properties. As part of the exercise, sample lights have been installed in a few locations so that the lighting could be experienced. The good news is that we have received no objections about them.

These lights will also include smart controls so that Village Hall will automatically know of any failures in live time. Additionally, we will have the capacity to address intensity concerns that may arise. While this is not an inexpensive capital project, the project has been financed in a way that the energy and maintenance savings will keep this a cash-positive improvement.

All purchase orders for the vendors have been issued and a contract has been signed with the contractor doing the installations, so work is scheduled to begin shortly.

Interesting fact: The Village of Sea Cliff currently has 496 streetlights and will have 508 when this project is complete.

As it relates to the sewer grant monies from Nassau County that will assist residents with hook-up costs, we are on the final stretch of the paperwork. While everybody has the best of intentions, sometimes bureaucracy takes more time than we would like. There were many county departments that had to get on the same page. These included the Nassau County Department of Public Works, the County Attorney, the County Comptroller and the County Legislature. Everybody rightfully demands accountability along with proper oversight and control of government spending, and that is what has been occurring. Once again, I would like to acknowledge our County Legislator, Delia DeRiggi-Whitton, for spearheading this assistance to Sea Cliff residents who are part of the new sewer district.

On a final note. I would like to publicly offer good wishes to our recently retired Village Clerk, Marianne Lennon. At her retirement party, one of Marianne's daughters referred to her as my "work wife." I have worked side by side with Marianne for 14 years and didn't realize exactly how much I enjoyed it until she retired. She has been an unwavering friend and colleague and I wish her nothing but the best in her future endeavors.

#### Water Conservation in the Peak Season

Due to concerns about the long-term availability of safe drinking water on Long Island, CSHH commissioned and released a report called "Water Sustainability for Hempstead Communities," researched by leading local aquifer expert Sarah Meyland, MS, JD. Water usage for seven local water districts is analyzed as to whether they meet the required 15% water usage reduction set by the New York Department of Environmental Conservation. During the period studied, Sea Cliff's water usage increased by almost 4%.

Water usage goes up dramatically from May through September, referred to as the peak season. For Sea Cliff, these five months represent roughly 56% of water usage for the entire year. Long Island has one source of drinking water, and that is the groundwater aquifer. Taking less from the aquifer allows it to successfully recharge. Pumping out too much water can cause additional problems such as saltwater intrusion. The Lloyd aquifer on which

Sea Cliff relies is especially vulnerable to saltwater intrusion. Emerging contaminants also threaten our drinking water, and the risk of closing contaminated wells further diminishes the available water supply.

There are lots of ways for individuals to reduce water consumption, particularly during the peak season. These include use of lowmaintenance native plants, xeriscaping (landscape design that uses droughttolerant plants and other features), smart irrigation systems (such as rain sensors) that tailor watering needs to your yard, and rain-barrel collection systems for garden irrigation. Focusing on ways to conserve water as individuals and as a community is a great way to kick off this peak water-demand season.

#### The Sea Cliff Gardener

Get your pea seeds and shears ready as March is the month for pruning and pea planting. It is also the season for flower shows and sales. Hicks has a rather nice flower show from March 10-25, while the Philly flower show runs from March 4-12. Hicks is free, providing you can escape the show without stuffing your cart with seed packages and plants. Garvies Point Museum holds their Native Plant Sale April 29 so check their website for a list of plants available for purchase and preorder. I am looking to buy prairie smoke plants myself. Clark Gardens also has a plant sale in the be-

ginning of May, which is quite extensive.

Sea Cliff Beautification has a plant sale on May 6 at St Luke's Church on Glen Ave., which helps support community programs. During the summer of 2022, Beautification used prior funds to remove the weed trees from the hillside of Veteran's Memorial Park to improve the view of Hempstead Harbor. The **Beautification Garden Tour** will be held on June 10. and tickets will be on sale through local businesses. This is an opportunity to see the gardens and landscapes of your neighbors.

Poison ivy is the garden-

the most toxic of all weeds and should be approached well covered from head to toe. Do not pull, but rather cut it at the base and dispose of it in a heavy plastic bag. Poison Ivy should not be composted. Weed killers will alter the soil and kill the surrounding plants. I have exhausted numerous weeds by just cutting but this takes time and patience. A cocktail of salt, vinegar and water will be effective in killing this plant. I have a plastic bottle with a tiny hole that allows for accurate applications. If you have a crop of poison ivv and do not care about the soil, use er's nemesis. This is one of a small amount of Clorox

by the base of the plant. It is important to know what this plant looks like as it is not uncommon for hedges and privets to have the ivy grow up and through the branches.

As a follow-up to my last Bulletin article, more information was obtained about the former greenhouse at 46 Dubois Avenue. In the May 9, 1931 issue of Sea Cliff News, it was reported that "William S. Linnekin's garden, one of the loveliest in Sea Cliff, was completely ravaged on Monday night." The gardens and greenhouse were vandalized and approximately \$500 of rare Holland tulips were stolen.

Other plants were plucked or trampled, and the garwere destroyed. Sounds like Linnekin had a jealous adversary - and we think this type of vandalism only happens today. However, the greenhouse and gardens appeared to have recovered as in 1945. Isabelle De Puy Finholm was selling tomato plants, broccoli, lettuce, petunias, candytuft, and herbs from the greenhouse. She advertised in the Sea Cliff News.

We are now in the planting season. Plant it all: seeds, good actions, and hope.

#### Help Needed to Reduce Nitrogen in Hempstead Harbor

Excess nitrogen in our bays and harbors has been identified as one of the major water-quality problems that we face here and throughout Long Island. It can lead to algae growth (some of which are toxic to humans and animals), decreases in oxygen levels in the water (which can lead to fish kills), and loss of wetlands (which provide habitat and protection for our coasts).

How can homeowners in Sea Cliff help to reduce nitrogen in our harbor? In addition to installing a new septic system (for those who are not in a sewered area), you can participate in the Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor's oys-

Excess nitrogen in our ter gardening program. For most of you though, the easiest way is to reduce or jor water-quality prob-

- 1. **Don't fertilize!** If you like the way your lawn looks, then you don't need to fertilize at all!
- 2. Keep grass clippings on your lawn. Grass is 80 percent water and so it takes a short period of time for clippings to decompose and provide natural. slowrelease nitrogen for a thriving, healthy lawn. Leaving grass clippings on the lawn allows you to lessen the amount of fertilizer you apply by up to 25 percent.
- 3. **Apply less fertilizer.** If you use fertilizer, ap-

ply one-third to one-half the amount recommended on the fertilizer bag.

- 4. Calibration is key. If you fertilize, calibrate your spreader at the correct application rates. Equipment used to spread fertilizer should be calibrated for a single application rate of a maximum of 0.6 pounds of total nitrogen per 1,000 square feet at least once annually or each time fertilizer products are changed. Directions are also available on the Cornell Cooperative Extension of Suffolk Countv website.
- 5. **Timing is everything.** If you are going to fertilize, apply it at the right

time – close to Labor Day and/or Memorial Day. On Long Island, if you fertilize once a year, it makes the most sense to do so around Labor Day.

6. **Shrink your lawn.** One of the most effective methods is to replace part of your lawn

with less water-intensive landscaping, also known as "xeriscaping." Use native plant species, which require little to no fertilizer and can help to absorb and filter rainwater.



Don't forget to change your clocks and check your smoke detectors on Sunday,

#### Clearing the Air About Marijuana

Since the Marijuana Regulation and Taxation Act was enacted in New York in March 2021, confusion remains about marijuana's legal and medical realities. As part of NS-CASA's efforts to reduce the use and abuse of substances by our youth, we offer below some information on marijuana so you can inform yourself and your family.

The law allows those 21 years and older to use cannabis wherever smoking tobacco is permitted, except in a motor vehicle or where the Clean Air Act is in effect. Specifically, it allows for adult possession of up to 3 ounces of cannabis and up to 24 grams of cannabis concentrate. An adult may grow up to three marijuana plants at home; homes with more than one adult may grow up to six plants (three mature, three immature). It is illegal for anyone to consume marijuana while in a car or to drive while under the influence of, or impaired by, cannabis

So, does that mean that adults can purchase adultuse marijuana locally now? The answer may surprise you - no! At the end of 2021, the Town of Oyster Bay, the City of Glen Cove and the Village of Sea Cliff all opted-out of permitting retail sale of marijuana in their jurisdictions, so no LEGAL retail sales of marijuana are permitted in our community. For a complete review of what is legal and illegal to sell in our community, please go to our website at www.nscasa.org/talk-to-your-kids.

As important as legality is to the conversation around marijuana, equally critical is the discussion of its impact on teen health. For example:

• Marijuana potency has steadily increased in the past decades, up from about 4% THC levels in the 1980's to an average of 15% today. More disconcerting is that marijuana extracts, used in dabbing and edibles, contain on average 50% THC and can go as high as 90%. This doesn't include the risk of marijuana being laced with any more powerful drug. The

message to parents: This is NOT necessarily the pot of your youth. Don't assume it's the same strength and impact.

- Marijuana use is not safe for kids. Research suggests that kids may face greater mental health risks such as worsened depression and anxiety, poor attention and memory problems. Using a cannabis product with a THC potency of over 15% is linked to a three-fold increase in the likelihood of experiencing mental health and other problems.
- Much like alcohol, marijuana affects judgment and general motor skills, which is especially risky for new and inexperienced drivers. Driving while high on weed is not safer than driving drunk!
- The risk of developing marijuana use disorder is stronger for people who start using marijuana during their youth and for those who use marijuana more frequently. Studies suggest that 17% of those who start using

marijuana in their teens will become dependent on it

Here are a few suggestions of what you can do to address these risks:

- Know the facts and TALK to your kids; www.NSCASA.org is full of FACTS!
- Stay informed by joining NS-CASA via our website. We are planning a marijuana education event for March 2023. Join as a member so you

don't miss info on our next event!

- If you're an adult recreational user, buy legally from a reputable vendor and lock it up to keep it away from youth.
- If you see illegal sales, feel empowered to call the Sixth Precinct at 516-573-6600.

#### **April is Fair Housing Month**

April is designated as Federal Fair Housing Month to celebrate adoption of Section VIII of the Civil Rights Act, commonly known as the Fair Housing Act (FHA). The FHA was signed into law by Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson during the period following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King in 1968.

The Act prohibits discrimination in housing activities against certain protected classes: race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, and familial status (i.e., presence of children under the age of 18 in the household or pregnancy). Sexual orientation, gender identity and HIV/AIDS status, while not specifically listed, may also be covered by the existing protected classes. Housing and housing-related activities covered by the FHA include, but are not limited to, apartment and home rentals, real estate sales and mortgage lending.

Actions that discriminate against a person who may be a member of a protected

class (or classes) might include:

- Refusal to negotiate, rent or sell housing to
