Welcome to the Spring/Summer quarterly edition of the Village Bulletin, the official publication of the Village of Sea Cliff.

As we anticipate these wonderful days and months ahead in our village, I want to extend a heartfelt thanks to all the residents of Sea Cliff for the opportunity to serve another term as your Mayor. It is a privilege to work with the community and the Board of Trustees to realize our vision for this square mile. I also wish to welcome our newly elected Trustee, Elena Villafane, as well as reelected Trustee Dina Epstein. Along with our Deputy Mayor, Trustee Kevin McGilloway, and Trustee Henriette Rohl, the Board of Trustees endeavors to provide you, our fellow residents, with the best services that can be provided in the most cost-effective manner with a budget that represents these goals.

In this regard, the Board of Trustees recently adopted our village's 2019-2020 budget which is within the state's 2 percent tax cap. This year's budget represents a virtual flat tax differential from the prior fiscal year. Along with this practical and reasoned

budget, our village continues to maintain the highest bond rating available and continues to receive a "no stress" rating from the New York State Comptroller's Office.

Beyond the recent adoption of our village budget and its firm financial status, this administration has set forth certain goals for the future. In addition to our ongoing committees and Trustee Liaison positions, I have created two new working committees. The first will be the Long-Term Planning Committee which will gather relevant information from our community and our various committees to formulate a strategic plan to the benefit of future generations of Sea Cliff residents. The second will be a Village Code Review Task Force which will continue the work of the Subdivision Task Force. The goal of this new committee will be to complete a comprehensive review of our 1979 Village Code and make updated recommendations to the Board of Trustees for their review and potential adoption.

Our village embraces the next few months with the tell-tale signs of a vibrant community. We cherish the welcoming of spring with our beautiful parks maintained by our dedicated DPW staff. Along with our staff, our village environment is enhanced by the Sea Cliff Beautification Committee's many devoted efforts, including the beautiful displays of flowering baskets along Sea Cliff Avenue.

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The Mayor's Annual Meeting of Minds

It was 136 years ago that Sea Cliff convened for its first ever organizational meeting. Today, despite our rapidly changing climate and society, Sea Cliff remains relatively unchanged. Residents gathered at this year's annual meeting, which was held on April 1, to witness citizens' true commitment to the village that John Canning calls "the miracle mile."

At the meeting, Boy Scout Troop 43 presented the colors and Pledge of Allegiance, officially starting Sea Cliff's new year. Mayor Edward Lieberman was sworn in for a term of two years, taking the local oath of office, which was administered by Village Justice Charles Parisi. Shortly following his solemn promises to the Village, Mayor Lieberman congratulated Dina Epstein and Elena Villafane on their reelection as Village Trustees for terms of two years.

The meeting progressed as Mayor Lieberman delivered his State of the Village Address.

Thanking Sea Cliff's citizens and volunteers for their service while reminding his fellow Sea Cliffians of how lucky they are to live in such a special and unique village, Mayor Lieberman said, "[Sea Cliff's] always ready and able core of volunteers ... let it be heard and now for all to acknowledge that without you we would be lifeless. It is you, our citizens, who work countless hours to promote the welfare of our village." Mayor Lieberman went on to thank the first responders who have dedicated themselves to the village.

The mayor discussed the accomplishments of his administration, citing his plastic bag law as well as renovations to the Village Library and other key infrastructures in the village, once again reminding the citizens of his commitment to Sea Cliff. The mayor reviewed village initiatives such as becoming more environmentally conscious, passing progressive sexual harassment policy, and

improving the lives of citizens young and old alike.

The mayor reminded citizens of the new legislation outlawing the use of plastic straws, cutlery, and styrofoam cups, as well as continuing his work on the sewer line and keeping Sea Cliff beautiful. As always, the mayor thanked his wife Kathy Lieberman for her efforts as the First Lady of the Village of Sea Cliff.

The meeting continued with the appointments of village boards, committees, commissions and staff. A highlight was the mayor's declaration of former Village Justice John Reali as Judge Emeritus, citing his countless years of service and unstinting commitment to the Village. The final benediction of the ceremony was done by Rabbi Irwin Huberman, who made remarks on Sea Cliff's true diversity, recalling the joint tree and menorah lighting in December, which proves to be a testament to Sea Cliff's closely-knit

Traffic Safety Update

As spring is here, more Sea Cliffians will be out and about on their bikes. The members of the Sea Cliff Traffic and Safety Committee want to remind you about the laws you should know that will protect you as a cyclist. Even more important, we want to remind you of your obligations as a driver when you encounter a cyclist on the road.

Critical Laws for Cyclists
VTL 1231 Traffic laws apply to persons riding bicycles. Every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway shall be granted all of the rights and shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle.

VTL 1238 Helmets and carrying children. A child under age one is not permitted to ride on a bicycle.

A child one or more years of age but less than five years of age must wear an approved helmet and be carried in a properly affixed child carrier.

A child five or more years of age but less than fourteen years of age must wear an approved helmet.

VTL 1234(a) Riding on roadways. Bicycles shall be ridden near the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway or upon a usable right-hand shoulder in such a manner as to prevent undue interference with the flow of traffic except when preparing for a left turn or when reasonably necessary to avoid conditions that would make it unsafe to continue along near the right-hand curb or edge.

VTL 1234 (c) Any person operating a bicycle who is entering the roadway from a private road, driveway, or an alley or over a curb shall come to a full stop before entering the roadway.

VTL 1236 Lamps and other equipment on bicycles.

(a) Every bicycle when in use during the period from one-

half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise shall be equipped with a white lamp on the front and with a red or amber light visible to the rear.

(b) No person shall operate a bicycle unless it is equipped with a bell or other device capable of giving a signal audible for a distance of at least one hundred feet, except that a bicycle shall not be equipped with nor shall any person use upon a bicycle any siren or whistle.

(e) Every bicycle when in use during the period from one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise shall be equipped with reflective devices.

VTL 375 24(a) Use of earphones while driving or riding a bicycle. It shall be unlawful to operate a bicycle while the operator is wearing more than one earphone.

VTL 1235 Carrying articles. No person operating a bicycle

shall carry any package, bundle, or article which prevents the driver from keeping at least one hand upon the handle bars.

Obligations of Motorists
Amongst the many laws that exist to protect the rights of cyclist and other road users, these may be some that are less familiar but you should know.

VTL 1146 Drivers to exercise due care. (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, every driver of a vehicle shall exercise due care to avoid colliding with any bicyclist, pedestrian, or domestic animal upon any roadway and shall give warning by sounding the horn when necessary.

VTL 1122 The operator of a vehicle overtaking, from behind, a bicycle proceeding on the same side of a roadway shall pass to the left of such bicycle at a safe distance until safely clear thereof.

VTL 1214 Opening and

closing vehicle doors. No person shall open the door of a motor vehicle on the side available to moving traffic unless and until it is reasonably safe to do so and can be done without interfering with the movement of other traffic, nor shall a person leave a door open on the side of a vehicle available to moving traffic for a period of time longer than necessary to load or unload passengers.

As you have seen the new signage around our village, please make a conscious effort to “Share the Road” with others. We also encourage you to stop or proceed slowly through our many uncontrolled intersections, come to a full stop at all stop signs, and drive at or below the speed limit. Judge John Reali has long served the Village of Sea Cliff as Village Justice, Associate Village Justice and as a member of the Board of Trustees. At Sea Cliff’s annual organizational meeting on April 1, Mayor Ed-

ward Lieberman and the Board of Trustees commemorated Judge Reali’s service by bestowing upon him the perpetual title, “Judge Emeritus.”

After thirty-eight years of service, Judge Reali has made the honorable decision to step down from the position of Associate Village Justice, sparking a commemoration of his longstanding commitment to Sea Cliff. Judge Reali has served as a role model for Sea Cliff residents, as he has set a gold standard for community service and volunteering.

Judge Reali has served his village in more ways than one, as he served as a Village Trustee from 1980 to 1990, as well as serving as Village Justice from

- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it

The Sea Cliff Gardener

Summer months are festooned with flowers, herbs and veggies, all blooming and coming to life. It is a celebration and what most of us have been waiting for through those long winter months. It is time to put in heat-loving vegetable plants and sow plenty of basil, cilantro, dill and even more basil. Veggies should include beans, carrots, beets, kale, Swiss chard, lettuce, squash, sunflowers, cucumbers, eggplant and, of course, tomatoes. Think about adding a rain barrel this year. It will save on your water bill and is an excellent source of free water for the garden. Of course, take long walks in some of our local treasures like Welwyn Preserve and Garvies Point Museum and Preserve in Glen Cove, Clark Gardens in Albertson, or just walk along the beautiful streets of Sea Cliff. Think about picnicking in Clifton or Spooky park. Breathe deep and enjoy the sun!

Now that we are on the verge of summer, it is time to do something fun in the garden.

All homes deserve a secret garden, or a protected, sheltered

garden, that is hidden away and typically unexpected. One of my favorite locations for a secret garden is between two garages or some of those areas along the back line of a property that are rarely visited. This can be a spot for perhaps meditation, or as a beautiful nook, a spot used for communing with nature and/or an inspiring place for painting. Recommendations for these areas are hostas, trumpet vines, lilies, butterfly bushes and other perennials. Lastly, add chimes, gazing balls and a traditional statue based on one's beliefs. Secret gardens demand serenity so all plants and objects should be aligned accordingly. The last to place is a large sitting rock which can be procured from almost any local nursery/stone place. Trellis work can block out exposure to your neighbors and can be obtained locally from any lumber place.

My secret garden is between two garages and wide enough to walk through. The sides are lined with hostas and there is a butterfly bush at the head. Along one garage there is a trumpet

vine and some ivy. The path is lined with varying slate and some other stepping stones designed by my daughter. There is an opportunity for creativity here! Under the butterfly bush is a large sitting rock which I obtained at a local stone place. Once completed you can enjoy your space for relaxation. It is a space to meditate or simply to hide when the world becomes heavy and sad.

Things to Do:

Garage Sale Day in Sea Cliff, First Saturday in June or June 1st. While this is not a gardening event, it is an excellent opportunity to buy used planters, bird houses and other gardening gear. I have purchased many items for use in the garden. Just remember to clean any pots with some bleach or vinegar with water to kill any viruses.

Succession planting: As you harvest one herb or veggie check the planting growth time and see if you can put in another crop. Lettuce, basil and dill all make good and easy succession crops.

Should We Worry About Sea Level Rise?

As someone who has worked in the environmental field for more than four decades, I have seen a lot of “gloom and doom” predictions, and so I was largely skeptical about the impacts of climate change and sea level rise. I have now been convinced that it is real, and that we need to do what we can to protect our coastal communities.

In February 2017, the NYS DEC adopted projected sea level rises for various regions around the state. For Long Island, they project a two to ten inch rise by the 2020s, an eight to thirty inch rise by the 2050s, and a fifteen to seventy-two inch rise by 2100.

At a recent meeting of the Long Island Sound Study's Citizens' Advisory Committee, a presentation was given by Daniel Bader, the Program Manager of the Consortium for Climate Risk in the Urban Northeast (CCRUN), which is based at Columbia University. Mr. Bader, who grew up in Roslyn, reported that in the last century, global sea levels have gone up about eight inches. Today it is rising faster—about one inch per decade. In our area, we are close to the global average and maybe a little higher.

Future projections of sea level rise are challenging. Climate models have several variables. Climate models are supercomputers that run different scenarios under different timespans. They predict CO2 levels and other factors. You might ask how can they predict the climate fifty to one-hundred years from now when they cannot accurately predict the weather two weeks from now? The answer is that weather and climate are not the same thing. Climate is more long range, and you can look at historical data to determine overall trends.

Also, according to Mr. Bader, there is growing concern over the West Antarctic Ice Sheets and their future stability. If they all melted, predictions are that the global mean sea level rise would be about three meters. He classifies this as high risk with low probability.

While most of Sea Cliff is highly elevated, this is still cause for concern. Most of our food comes through the Hunts Point Market in the Bronx. If it floods, this could have major impacts. We all have seen Shore Road by Tappen Beach inundated during major storms. These instances will likely become more frequent.

On top of this, the Army Corps of Engineers is currently reviewing various proposals that would protect New York City from major storms like Superstorm Sandy or worse and taking into account sea level rise. One of these proposals is to erect giant (100-foot-plus tall) tidal gates west of the Throgs Neck Bridge. When closed, these gates would cause “induced flooding” of the communities outside the gates (including Sea Cliff). The extent of this flooding has yet to be determined and will be looked at by the Army Corps.

So, what should and can we do? Appropriate actions can be categorized as follows: 1) Policy decisions such as where to allow construction and preparing emergency evacuation plans; 2) Engineering actions including designing to withstand floods; 3) Social programs such as implementing alert systems; and 4) Ecosystem-based adaptation such as restoring and expanding wetlands to help absorb storm impacts.
