

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VILLAGE TAXES

First Half Village Tax Payments are due June 1, 2012. Taxes may be paid by mail or at the office of the Village Clerk every Monday from 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Tuesday thru Friday between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., excepting holidays and such other times the Village Hall offices are closed.

When Penalties Apply
On all First Half Taxes paid on
or before July 2, 2012, no
penalty or interest will be
charged. If paid after July 2,
2012 interest will be added
monthly or for any fraction
thereof until paid at the current
rate in effect as set by the State
Commissioner of Taxation and
Finance as prescribed in subdivision 2 of Section 924-a of the
N.Y.S. Real Property Tax Law.

Transportation for America reports that the baby boom generation is the largest in U.S. history, with more than 77 million people born between 1946 and 1964. Baby boomers are also unique because they came of age during the unprecedented economic expansion that followed World War II, which helped fuel the rise of new suburban communities and increased reliance on the

automobile. As our Sea Cliff

ability may diminish over time increasing the need for affordable transportation alternatives. A 2004 study found that seniors age 65 and older who no longer drive make 15 percent fewer trips to the doctor, 59 percent fewer trips to shop or eat out, and 65 percent fewer trips to visit friends and family, than drivers of the same age.

Our Village of Sea Cliff is served by a host of public and private transportation services. Perhaps no one source is perfect; however, we are lucky to have many options insuring our seniors' mobility and independence. We can truly get just about anywhere; what a great place to live! Let's start on the public macro level. The Long Island Railroad has local stops serving our community. The train runs weekdays as well as weekends and can take you as far east as Oyster Bay and as west as Manhattan. Change in Jamaica for the "Air Train" bound for JFK and beyond, or once in the city find a

plethora of travel options to connect to. If help is required, a call ahead can insure you assistance at Penn Station. Long Island Transit offers express luxury motor coach service from Glen Cove directly to Mid-Wall Street and the World Financial Center weekdays with departures in the morning and return trips in the evening. The Nassau Inter County Express bus (NICE) has recently cut service in our area but continues to run rush hour service on the N27, Glen Cove to Hempstead (via the mall) and the N21 Glen Cove to Flushing (#7 Subway station). Both buses operate stops in Sea Cliff but only on weekdays, weekend service has been discontinued. If one is unable to get to a bus stop and the trip's start and end is within a 3/4 mile of a fixed bus route, AbleRide (run by NICE) may be appropriate. This is door to door daily service on an appointment basis. An application is necessary and it requires a doctor's certification of disability

In this struggling economy. budget cuts and schedule changes have regrettably made our public transpiration system less accessible and accommodating to the needs of our seniors. Midday and weekend travel has become strained. However, in Sea Cliff we are quite fortunate to have many community led transportation options. On the micro level, we do quite well. We are served by two local taxi companies who provide 24/7 service. Rotary Rides can provide medical transportation and may prove a suitable alternative when Able Ride is a poor fit. This is a community-funded service administered by The Glen Cove Senior Center. The Glen Cove Senior Center also provides transportation from Sea Cliff to and from all of its programs including a grocery shopping option on Mondays and Thursdays. Finally, our future focused Village of Sea Cliff

operates its own senior bus and offers door to door service on Wednesdays for grocery shopping and on Tuesdays and Fridays for the Mutual Concerns senior luncheon. Reservations can be made by calling Village Hall. If medical transportation is needed, the Sea Cliff Senior Action Committee has volunteer drivers who offer transportation to local doctor's appointments.

Transportation is and will remain a focus for Sea Cliff Senior Outreach. Opportunities to effect change on all levels exist and rest assured your needs will be represented. If you require transportation to insure your independence and good health, feel free to call Karen Montagnese, Senior Outreach Worker at 671-0080 x20. Together we can explore options and create a plan so that no senior is isolated or without ac-

cess to services.

site has been launched so that residents can more easily obtain information, applications contacts in the Village.

• Phase 1 of the renovation of Village Hall was completed. It is the intention of this Board to ensure that this building will be our Community Center for years to come.

 Our business community is buzzing with the addition of two new restaurants on Sea Cliff Av-

 We have begun a complete recodification of our Code Book which has taken countless hours of thoughtful work.

 The Village's relationships with our neighboring communities, the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York State and our Federal elected officials, has never been stronger. As most of you are aware, I met with Governor Cuomo several weeks back and I share the Governor's vision for a stronger and sustainable Empire State. Along with former Trustee Phil Como, I spent a couple of hours recently with US Congressman Steve Israel, who through redistricting, is likely to become our representative. We surveyed the Village, our buildings and parks, and I believe he will serve us well. • We survived Hurricane Irene this past August and as is typical in Sea Cliff, trouble brought us closer together as a community.

While the upcoming year will present challenges, the outlook for the Village is excellent. We held our budget hearing for fiscal year 2012-2013 on April 9 and despite incredible increases in health care,

pension and insurance costs, my proposed budget actually reduces spending. Despite a reduction in overall spending, there is also a reduction in other revenues so we are looking at a tax increase in the neighborhood of 1.6%.

While it is not solely a Sea Cliff issue, the proposed closing of the Glenwood LIPA plant could have some significant impact on our residents. We are working closely with the school district and our state officials to try to minimize the financial impact of such a drastic action.

We intend to move on to Phase 2 of the renovation of Village Hall and are continuing to seek alternative funding sources for this project. We are also investigating funding sources for a much needed major renovation to the children's library.

This summer we expect to hold public meetings in regard to recodification of the entire Village code and look forward to public input once a draft is prepared.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Trustees, all the appointed Board Members, the entire Village staff, the countless committees and volunteers, our thriving Arts community and all the residents who work so hard and selflessly to assure the quality of life we have come to enjoy.

Sea Cliff continues to be the shining star of the North Shore. The Board of Trustees and I are proud to be your representatives and advocates.



Daniel Whittemore was sworn in as the new chief of Sea Cliff Fire Department by Mayor Bruce Kennedy on April 5. Danny said he joined the fire department's Enterprise Hose Company in June of 1995 "to be part of a team to help out the community."

The chief's service record since joining the department includes serving as treasurer of

the Enterprise Hose Company in 1998 and 1999. He was elected Hose Company 2nd Lieutenant in 2001, 1st Lieutenant in 2002 and became captain of the company in 2003 and served in that role until 2005. Danny was recognized for setting up training and drills to make the fire department more efficient, and in 2006 he was given the department's highest award for his work, "Fireman of the Year." He was elected 1st Assistant Chief in 2011 and Department Chief in 2012.

As he moved up the ranks of the department, Danny said he has shared similar ranks in the department with his best friend since elementary school, Ernie Longobucco. Ernie is presently 1st assistant chief of the Sea Cliff Fire Department.

Danny said he grew up in Sea Cliff and attended Sea Cliff Elementary School, North Shore Middle School and graduated from North Shore High School. Presently, Danny serves as a member of the New

York City Police Department. Danny said the last serious fire that Sea Cliff had was the Harbor Lumber fire four years ago. He said he was the first into the building at that fire. He said he is proud of the work of the Sea Cliff Fire Department at that fire, as they saved the building.

In closing, Danny said he is also proud of the support he receives from the members of the department and the work they do. As chief, he looks forward to working with the members of the community.

Hempstead Harbor Protection Committee Receives EPA 2012 **Environmental Quality** Award

On April 27th, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency honored the Hempstead Har-bor Protection Committee (HHPC) by presenting the organization with a 2012 Environmental Quality Award for its efforts in achieving the highest standard for water quality and re-opening 2,500 acres to shellfish harvesting for the first time in over 40 years.

Bill Clemency, Chair of the HHPC, accepted the award at the EPA's headquarters in Lower Manhattan along with Sea Cliff Mayor Bruce Kennedy, HHPC Executive Director Eric Swenson, and Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor Board Member Kay Bromberg. Mr. Clemency stated, "When the nine local governments that make up the HHPC came together as a committee 17 years ago, we all hoped that one day we would see shell fishing again in Hempstead Harbor. Many of us felt that this was a distant dream - that maybe we would see it in our lifetime but there were so many obstacles that had to be tackled first. This achievement shows that things can change and will, as long as there is a vision and everyone is willing to work together toward that goal."

HHPC's Executive Director

Eric Swenson added: "We are honored to receive this award. but in all fairness this was a team effort that involved many players working hard over many years. This would not have been possible without the efforts of a citizens' group, the Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor, which was formed in 1986: the nine member municipalities which have collectively invested tens of millions of dollars into cleaning up and protecting the harbor; the funding agencies like the New York State Department of State, the DEC and the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation that fund much of what we do; and lastly the Village of Sea Cliff for providing administrative support and a meeting space for us to function."

Mayor Kennedy added that Former Sea Cliff Mayor Ted Blackburn and then-Assemblyman Tom DiNapoli were visionaries when they created Long Island's first inter-municipal watershed organization. There can be no better proof of their foresight than for us to achieve the highest possible water quality standard and then to be recognized by the federal government as environmental leaders for the state".

Pool Safety Changes

New Laws That Affect Your Pools

Since we are always concerned with safety in the Village, we are providing a summary of the latest pool safety requirements as published in the New York State Building Code. If Village residents wish to discuss any items in detail, they can contact the Building Superintendent at Village Hall. Pool Alarms

• Every swimming pool that is installed, constructed or sub-stantially modified after December 14, 2006 must be equipped with an approved pool alarm which:

Is capable of giving an audible alarm when it detects a child entering the water;

Is audible poolside and at another location on the premises;

Is not an alarm device which is located on person(s) or which is dependent on device(s) located on person(s) for its proper oper-

A pool alarm must be capable of detecting entry into the water at any point on the surface of the swimming pool. If necessary to provide detection capability at every point on the surface of the swimming pool, more than one pool alarm must be installed. Pool alarms are not re-

quired in: • A hot tub or spa equipped

with a safety cover or any swimming pool (other than a hot tub or spa) equipped with an automatic power safety

Pool Barriers (Fences)

Barriers for all pools must be at least 4 feet (48 inches) high.

In addition to these requirements, there are detailed pool safety requirements to which you or your contractor must adhere during a pool installation. Be sure to consult with the Village Superintendent of Buildings as you plan and build your pool project.

These safety requirements under New York State Building Code are to provide for the life safety, health and welfare of its residents. The building department of the Village of Sea Cliff hopes that this information is helpful to its residents.

Clifton Park and Its Use

Clifton Park is the largest park in Sea Cliff and was acquired by the Village in 1915 from the Dubois family. Clifton Park is home to the 8 World War I Memorial Oak Trees recognizing those from Sea Cliff who gave their lives in WWI. It is also home to two of the Village's three baseball fields.

It is a park for all residents to enjoy. In order to keep the park beautiful the Village has set up rules and regulations to help maintain the park's magnificence. Those who wish to play organized sports on the fields must acquire a permit from the Village which requires insurance to protect the Village should a participant or spectator be injured. The permit requires a fee to help defray the cost of maintaining the fields. This also allows the Village to schedule various organized sports so games do not interfere with each other or Village other sponsored

During scheduled sporting and other events, the field may ш not be used for casual recreational sports. During times when no organized sports are taking place, the field is available for recreational use by all. Those residents who wish to enjoy a walk in the park with their dogs are welcomed. However Clifton Park IS NOT A DOG RUN. Dogs must be on leashes at all times. If your dog takes care of business in the park, it is your responsibility to clean up after your pet. In an effort to assist you, there are doggie bag stations located on the perimeter of the park.

The park is surrounded on four sides by residential homes and is therefore off limits after sunset. The Department of Public Works has placed blue recycling pails at several locations in the park. When you are done with your drinking container, you should place it in one of the recycling pails provided. All other trash should be placed in the regular garbage pails located on the perimeter of the park. If a garbage pail is full, please take any trash with you when leaving the park and dispose of it properly.

Thank you all for helping keep all of our parks beautiful and enjoyable for all.



Grilling Safety

by Drew Lawrence, Superintendent of Buildings

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on your way to safe grilling. SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be place well

away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- CHARCOAL GRILL
 There are several ways to get

the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.

- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid.
 Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use

fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.

 When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE GRILLS

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

Betsy Nagy Remembered



John J. Burns Memorable Sea Cliff Resident

Born in Sea Cliff in 1913, John Burns lived his entire life in our Village with the exception of the years he served in WWII.

The son of one of Sea Cliff's early police officers, John had an active childhood during the period just after WWI. He attended Sea Cliff School, graduating from the high school in 1931. For a time prior to military service, John worked in the fuel oil business and, naturally ambitious, was in management before too long.

John was married to Norah Patterson, a high school classmate, who provided him with many years of a happy and loving partnership. On many occasions during John's career in public service, Norah was always close by to remind him of the name of whatever individual who happened to be approach-

After the war, John returned to Sea Cliff and in 1947 was elected Mayor, running under the banner of the newly formed Civic Progress Party. tenure as mayor lasted until 1952, at which time he was elected to the New York State Assembly. Later, John also served locally as the Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay.

John's long and successful career as a public servant was punctuated by many friendships and close associations with a wide variety of people from the everyday citizen to public figures such as Robert Moses and Nelson Rockefeller. At one point in his career, John was privileged to be a candidate for Nas-County Executive, a campaign in which he was honored to run but ultimately lost to Eugene Nickerson.

John's involvement in the affairs of our Village continued throughout his life. He was a longtime member of our fire department, the driving force behind the creation of our Centennial Garden, the organizer of Sea Cliff's Bicentennial Celebration and one of the planners of the beautiful Memorial Park.

In his later years, John was also known by the nickname m


