We all have a tremendous amount to be grateful for as free people living in a democratic society. I encourage our entire community to take one hour on Monday May 25 to attend the Memorial Day Parade and ceremony to recognize the ultimate sacrifice so many of our veterans paid to ensure our freedoms. We have many veterans in our community that attend and your show of support means so much to them - and you will leave feeling more fulfilled as a result.

As usual we are preparing for summer in Sea Cliff with our DPW staff preparing the beach, our parks, steps, and walkways for the season. The roads took a beating this winter and we have budgeted for a significant amount of road work this year, which has already begun. We will be completely repaving some streets, repairing others and filling potholes as required. Please call Village Hall if you know of problem spots.

Last month the Board of Trustees and I passed a budget that not only continues the exceptional level of services our residents appreciate but also provides for significant capital improvements to our facilities and purchases of new equipment, machinery and vehicles. Sea Cliff's Annual Meeting

Mayor Bruce Kennedy welcomed everyone to the Annual Organization Meeting of the Incorporated Village of Sea Cliff on Monday, April 6. Presentation of Colors and the Pledge of Allegiance was led by Boy Scout Troop 43. Reverend Kirtland Watkins gave the Invocation.

Mayor Kennedy welcomed Andrew Jerry Puca as a firefighter to the Engine and Hose Company.

Mayor Kennedy thanked Trustee Carol Vogt for her years of service on the Board. Trustee Vogt addressed the community:

"For a significant portion of my teaching career, I taught American history to high school juniors. The first day of class I would write the name of the course on the board, U period S period, History and then I would erase the word history and the periods after the U and the S.

The thing I wanted my students to know is that the U period S period is really US and that the extent to which this country succeeds is directly proportional to the extent to which its citizens take responsibility and get involved in their nation and their communities. It was a bit of a gimmick and a way to get their attention but it is something I really believe, one of the things that is central to the way I look at almost everything.

everything. I've been thinking about that for the past few days and about all of you who are here tonight. It's clear you know that about the U.S. and that's why you're willing to take on the responsibilities you are about to be given. As I step down as trustee, I promise to follow your example and continue to volunteer and be involved in this Village we all care about so much.

I leave knowing it's in good hands with Mayor Kennedy, Trustees Lieberman, Villafane, McGilloway and Epstein, supported by all of you and our hard working staff. I thank you and all of the residents of Sea Cliff for giving me the wonderful opportunity I have had for the past 6 years. It has been a privilege and an honor." Next John Reali administered the Constitutional Oath of Office to Mayor Kennedy and Trustee Lieberman.

Living with a chronic illness may be a challenge and can disrupt your life. Once your doctor delivers a diagnosis there are so many questions and concerns. Often doctors have limited time with patients and you may leave the office without a comprehensive understanding of what is next. It can be a fearful and an uneasy time. Fortunately, there are lots of supports in our community that can help you sift through information and navigate an effective path to a new level of wellness. It is important not to isolate yourself. Seek out a support network that will deliver to you the information that you need along with a wellness plan that can maintain, and even improve, your health. Redefine your wellness by taking charge of those variables of which you have control. You may not have power over your diagnosis or symptoms but you do have choices in regard to information, peer support, diet, exercise, stress reduction and self-care. These variables are tools at your disposal en route to a new understanding of what is your optimum health.

There are many local programs and support groups that specialize in both specific illnesses and general wellness. Some are free of charge and others, with the appropriate diagnosis, will be covered by Medicare. Here is a local sampling. At The NS/LIJ Hospital in Glen Cove there are wellness programs for Diabetes, Lung Disease, and Traumatic Brain Injury. St. Francis Hospital has many therapeutic programs including Woman's Health, Fitness Rehab and a Cancer Institute. Their DeMatteis Center for Cardiac Research & Education in Greenvale has a state of the art cardiac wellness program. Also in Greenvale, NYIT is home to the Adelle Smithers Parkinson's Program. At Winthrop Hospital in Mineola, there are many community informational programs in

addition to their Lung Center and their Diabetes Center and research facility. The Long Island Alzheimer's Foundation in Port Washington has many programs that treat and inform all levels of need. At The Glen Cove Senior Center, there is an Adult Day Program, also a great source of support. This is in addition to The Senior Center's regular daily schedule of programs that enhance the mind, spirit and body. Another resource is Silver Sneakers at The Glen Cove YMCA, with some insurance supplements membership is free. Finally, don't overlook what is around the corner. Mutual Concerns Senior Lunch and Socialization Program is held at St. Luke's on Tuesdays and Fridays. Connect here for information and support. On both days chair yoga is an option at 11:15 a.m.

Busy Winter of Construction Winds Down

In spite of the extreme cold and numerous snowstorms we experienced this year, the Village was coping with two large construction projects and preparing for our annual road replacement program.

Construction of 2200 feet of sanitary sewer pipe was installed on Sea Cliff Avenue from Prospect Avenue to Main Avenue along with 67 house connections for future hook ups. On May 4 and 5 the road restoration of Sea Cliff Avenue was completed where the top two inches of old pavement were ground off and a new curb to curb wearing course of asphalt was placed.

Our contractor, Novelli Brothers, Inc., did an amazing job installing this pipe which was as deep as 18 feet in some sections. They worked through frigid temperatures, ice and snow to complete the job in just four months when the contract allowed for nine months for final completion.

As we approached the end of the job, estimates showed that we would come in well below the contract award amount. As a result we would have excess grant money recessed lighting in the planned for this project. The Village asked the granters if we could extend the project to use the excess funds. The granters, New York State and Nassau County, approved the Village's

request.

As a result we had our Engineer, Dvirka and Bartilucci, design and layout an additional 550 feet of sanitary sewer pipe south on Roslyn Avenue from Sea Cliff Avenue to 15th Avenue, including house connections to an additional 12 parcels.

At the same time this project was in progress, the Village finished the renovation to the Stenson Library in time to celebrate the building's 100th Anniversary on May 15, 2015. The goal of the project was to add a handicapped bathroom, upgrade the HVAC system including converting from oil to natural gas for heating, upgrade the lighting and install a new drop ceiling.

As the project progressed and the old drop ceiling was removed it became clear to everyone involved in the project that the right thing to do was renovate the beautiful ceiling, which existed above the old drop ceiling. The contractor, Benchmark Construction Group of Westbury, was up to the task.

With the removal of the old radiators, the Village was able to replace modern stand alone shelves with built in shelves that matched the historic shelves and provide more open space within the Library.

While this project has exceeded the original cost projection, the Stenson Library now reflects the history and grandeur deserved by our residents and their children.

In preparation for the Village's annual road replacement program, which will go out to bid shortly, the Village had an engineering firm survey all the roads in the Village and develop a map that rated all road sections A, B, C or D. Roads listed as A or B were in good to excellent condition or recently paved. Roads listed as C were showing signs of disrepair and would soon need attention and roads rated as D were priority for replacement.

Based on these ratings and gas main or water main replacements planned for this year, we will put together a list of roads for replacement this year. With an increase in Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPs) money, this year's road program will be replacing almost \$600,000 of roads rated C or D.

Former Trustee John P. Kle 1915 – 2015

John P. Kle, a 64-year resident of Sea Cliff passed away on February 18, 2015, two months short of his 100th birthday. Born and raised in Chicago, John graduated from the University of Chicago and then received his law degree from New York University. He served as an attorney in the United States Army. While in New York he met and married Madeline Faudino, who had moved to the city from her birthplace in the Italian Alps. They moved to Sea Cliff in 1950 where John opened a law office. They raised four children and both became very active in community affairs. John performed many pro bono hours of legal work in behalf of the Glen Cove Housing Authority and the Glen Cove Boys and Girls Club on Glen Cove Avenue.

John was very active in the local Rotary Club and the North Shore Kiwanis Club. In 1983, he was elected to a two-year term on the Sea Cliff Board of Trustees. He received a Sea Cliff Civic Association White Cap Award in 2005. Madeline meanwhile helped launch the Sea Cliff Mini Mart and was a driving force behind the recognition and appreciation of Sea Cliff artists with an Artist of the Month Program. Madeline received a White Cap Award in 1968. She and John were married 70 years before she passed away in 2012.

Microbeads Can Cause Damage To Our Waterways by Eric Swenson, Executive Director of the Hempstead Harbor Protection Committee

Who would have thought that using a body scrub or toothpaste could be harming fish?

Many products like face and body scrubs, hand soaps and toothpastes now contain what are known as "microbeads". They can range in size from less than 10 micrometers (about the diameter of a red blood cell) to a few millimeters (a credit card is about a millimeter wide). Most are less than one millimeter in size. They are often brightly colored and can be seen suspended in the body washes and other products that contain them. A single bottle of face scrub can contain over 300,000 plastic beads. As these products are used by consumers, they are rinsed off and go down the drain and if you are on a sewer system, they make their way to the waste water treatment plant where they are too small to be captured and thus end up being discharged into local waterways (Glen Cove Creek for Glen Cove and some Sea Cliff residents, and the Atlantic Ocean for Roslyn resi-

dents).

Some of these microbeads are the size of certain fish eggs and can be ingested by fish and other aquatic organisms. Once eaten, the microbeads deprive them of nutrients and can lodge in their digestive systems or stomachs. Further, before ingestion, harmful substances like PCBs and polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) can become attached to these microbeads. As smaller fish and organisms are eaten by larger fish and organisms, these toxins then work their way up the food chain and can eventually end up on our dinner table.

A recent study was undertaken by SUNY Fredonia researchers at the behest of NYS Attorney General Eric Schneiderman. They sampled 34 wastewater treatment plants around the state including the Cedar Creek plant in Nassau County (where Roslyn's wastewater goes) and found microbeads in three quarters of the samples. They also claim that about 1.3 tons of microbeads are discharged each year in Nassau County alone.

To complicate matters, "microbeads" are often not listed as such on product labels. To know if the products you use contain them, look for ingredients labelled "polyethylene", "polypropylene", or "acrylate (co)polymer". Some products use natural ingredients like ground apricot pits, oatmeal, or pumice.

Fortunately, many manufacturers have already stopped or are removing microbeads from their products. The list includes five of the largest cosmetic and personal care companies - Proctor & Gamble, Unilever, Colgate Palmolive,

There is also legislation proposed, both federally and in New York State, to ban or phase out microbeads. At this point it appears that state legislation has a better chance of passing, but nothing is certain. The best way to prevent these microbeads from entering the ecosystem is simple - don't buy them.



Our next exhibit "Sea Cliff in the Sixties", which opens in the fall, will feature Bertram W. Scholes' photographs, which were taken in the 1950's through the 1970's. At a quick glance, Bertram W. Scholes' photos of the streets of Sea Cliff in the 1960's, with the 1950's cars on the street, are reminiscent of the recent photos from the streets of Havana. Richard Mitchell lost his life in the Vietnam War in 1966 along with Carl Richard Dice and Erwin L. Edelman in 1969.



Stenson Memorial Library Grand-Reopening and Centennial

By 1883, a library had been established in the Methodist Episcopal Sunday School with a collection of 362 books. In 1891, a well-known Sea Cliff resident, Mr. Rinehart, donated "a fine library of nearly 1000 choice volumes" and requested "that the citizens generally shall enjoy its advantages..." Thus, the library was then open to the public--one evening a week.

The library grew and became known as the Sea Cliff Public Library. It was located on the second floor of the present North Building on Central Avenue. Mr. John Forster was selected as librarian and janitor.

By 1908, "the ladies of the Good of the Village Association.... set out to obtain \$10,000 or more for an independent building" for a library. However, Mrs. Mary Stenson announced her intention to give Sea Cliff a library building and adjoining property in memory of her husband, Samuel Stenson. The Stensons wintered in Brooklyn and summered in Sea Cliff, which they considered their home. Samuel had been an early supporter of the library. He was one of the first trustees. In 1895, he suggested the library should have "a smoking and recreation room with conveniences



He also instructed that the bills for this should be sent to him. On May 13, 1915, the Stenson Memorial Library opened. The building was erected for \$18,000. Funding for the furniture and landscaping was provided by the Good of the Village Association from the money they had previously raised.

The Stenson Library served all Sea Cliff residents until 1971, when the adult section moved into the former Methodist Church. The Stenson Memorial Library became the Children's Library. The first

Children's Librarian was Mrs. Virginia (Mimi) Mullen.

This year, the newly renovated and restored Stenson Memorial Library is 100 years old. A Grand Re-Opening and Centennial Celebration will be held on May 30 from 1 p.m. to 4.p.m. at the Library. Family activities will include face painting, balloons, and refreshments. Formal presentations will take place at 1:15 p.m.

The menu is an interesting mix of cuisines which reflect the chef's


prior experiences in French, Mexican and American oriented restaurants. He believes this varied background enables him to create an eclectic blend of interesting food combinations.

The first part of the plan is to do everything possible to save the trees that are still surviving but struggling. With the help of a professional tree service, we will be trying different solutions to protect the bases of the trees, using aeration to loosen the soil, adding amendments to improve the soil quality, pruning out all of the dead growth and removing and replacing any trees that die. In fact, by the time this article is published the five trees that were removed in early April will have been replaced with five new, healthy London

Planes!

The second part of the program is well underway - selective pruning to restore the trees to a more natural shape instead of using the somewhat drastic Pollarding technique that reduced the trees to stumps every seven years or so. Through our research we learned that Pollarding actually should be done at least every other year and that the seven year schedule, established so many years ago, has weakened and damaged the limbs, stressed the tree's ability to create food and has potentially helped the fungus Anthracnose, to thrive. All of these factors have contributed to the decline we're seeing, with the extreme north end showing the most damage and death.

those cases we will replace them with the money that is annually set aside for new trees by the Board of Trustees, generous donations from Village organizations like The Good of the Village which purchased the new London Plane that was planted last fall, as well as any fees that are paid into the new Re-Leaf Fund by residents who would rather pay a fee than plant a new tree on their property when they remove a tree over 20" in diameter.

So the next time you stroll under the Shore Rd. London Plane trees take note of the pruning progress, the trunk guards and other damage mitigation techniques we'll be testing and, most especially, note the five new trees that will eventually catch up to their elders and will ensure that the entrance to Sea Cliff always feels like a Welcome Home!
