First Half Village Tax When Penalties Apply Payments are due June 1, 2017. Taxes may be paid by mail or at the office of the Village Clerk every Monday from 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Tuesday through Friday between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., excepting holidays and such other times the Village Hall offices are closed.

On all First Half Taxes paid on or before July 3, 2017, no penalty or interest will be charged. If paid after July 3, 2017, interest will be added monthly or for any fraction thereof until paid at the current rate in effect as set by the State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance as prescribed in subdivision 2 of Section 924-a of the N.Y.S. Real Property Tax

Residential Rehabilitation Program: Improving Village Life One Home at a Time

The Residential Rehabilitation Program is a grant resource that allows low income families to have certain types of improvement work performed on their owner occupied homes. Households must not exceed HUD defined low income limits, among other requirements, to qualify for assistance.

Repairs and/or upgrades will relate to weatherization, energy efficiency and health and safety. Repairs performed under this grant are determined on an individual basis and may vary from home to home. Funding is NOT AVAILABLE for decora-

The Sea Cliff Village Community Development program will be accepting applications from Sea Cliff residents for the Residential Rehabilitation wait list. Applications will be available June 5, 2017 to pick up at Vil-

lage Hall and to print out from the Village website, www.sea-cliff-ny.gov. Eligibility requirements, submission instructions and deadlines will be included with the application. Placement on the wait list does not guarantee a grant will be received or that work will be performed. Program funding is dependent upon annual federal and local Community Development Block Grant allocations. VOLUNTEERS NEEDED For newly formed Sea Cliff Technology Task Force

At the April 3rd Annual Sea Cliff Village Meeting, Mayor Ed Lieberman announced the formation of a Technology Task Force to "seek ways to employ information technology to enhance the Sea Cliff experience for residents and staff." Mayor Lieberman asked me to organize and chair the Task Force, given my education (MS-Computer Science) and work experience (Chief Information Officer) - and my desire to keep contributing to the Village after my term as Trustee expires next year.

Although we will certainly refine the specifics around the Task Force as it moves forward, the basic goal immediately translates into the following themes:

- Information Access & Security securely making information more easily available to authorized people, starting with improved website navigation
- Connectivity providing new ways to improve communication among staff, trustees, and residents, including electronic surveys and video-conferencing
- Operational Efficiency introducing electronic forms to optimize Village processes and better tools for analyzing/reporting information

- Government Transparency live streaming/recording of important public meetings for those who cannot attend in person
- Finances exploring ways to costeffectively deliver the above with minimal net impact on the Village budget

The initial plan is for these and other areas to be addressed by various working groups, with a monthly coordinating meeting to share ideas and formulate/execute an action plan. The Task Force's kick-off meeting was on Monday May 15th at 8 p.m. at Village Hall. If you could not make the meeting, no problem — you can still help in many ways such as reviewing materials, doing research, and testing new functions.

I have already heard from a number of residents and staff interested in participating in the Task Force, including Trustee Deb McDermott who has volunteered to be my partner in overseeing the Task Force. However, we need more volunteers – with the only requirement a willingness to help!

The Trees of Sea Cliff

Watch out for my roots!

Did you know that the roots are the most important part of a tree, not its top? The following comments from Donald C. Willeke, Director of the American Forestry Association, provide some interesting information about tree roots.

Tree roots must have oxygen in order to function. Covering roots with dirt or water can deprive roots of vital oxygen supplies since the feeder roots of most trees are only in the top 6-12 inches of soil. These feeder roots are mostly in a large, shallow disk-like area under the tree that is 2-4 times the area covered by the crown (top) of the trees. It is a myth, for instance, that Oak trees have a long "tap" root that goes straight down.

Grading dirt over the feeder roots, or grading dirt away from the root zone anywhere under their branches, suffocates or removes the feeder roots and kills all or most of the tree crown in 1-3 years. Compaction of the soil under trees (construction vehicles, parking of cars, repeated walking by people, etc.) is almost as deadly to trees as covering their roots with soil. Trenching to install utilities or a sprinkler system cuts a tree's

roots — multiple trenches can sever most of a tree's roots, leading to slow tree death. Changing soil grades so that the soil stays wet usually results in suffocation of all roots that are wet due to lack of oxygen, and the tree dies.

Finally, trees communicate with each other through their roots. Wounding or pruning Oak tree trunks and branches any time from early spring to late summer can result in the Oak wilt disease infecting the tree. If there are a clump of Oak trees in the area, a single tree's infection will spread through the intertwined roots to all the other Oak trees in the clump, killing all the trees.

Stress on a tree usually does not manifest itself immediately. A drought one year may cause a large number of trees to die in the immediately following years. Cutting of feeder roots may lead to increasing loss of branches in the tree top canopy the following year. Once stressed this way, the tree becomes less able to fend off attacks by insects and other diseases, contributing to rapid decline in tree health.

Birth of a Village – Sea Cliff's First President

On October 12, 2018, the Village of Sea Cliff will celebrate its 135th year of Incorporation. Have you wondered how Sea Cliff managed to create its own school, library, fire department, police department and government separate from its surrounding communities?

Perhaps the Village's past as Methodist religious retreat forged an independence and desire to chart its own course, even as Glen Cove provided a school and neighborhood "bucket brigades" fought fires.

One man stands out for his generosity and will to make Sea Cliff an independent, safe and educated village. Frederick W. Geissenhainer, a prominent lawyer from New York City and Sea Cliff resident, and a few other generous souls, opened a school

the village with 50 students. In a few months, a public meeting voted to petition the Legislature to set up a separate Sea Cliff School District.

In 1884, a group of men organized the F.W. Geissenhainer Engine Co. #1. Mr. Geissenhainer paid for a Remington hand engine known as the "little giant". Mr. Geissenhainer also supplied the water for the fire engine from his private reser-

Mutual Concerns: A History

About 35 years ago village residents Noreen Martone and Rose Capuco were approached by the Sea Cliff clergy and informed that there were a growing number of people in the village who were in financial trouble. most of whom needed food. Noreen and Rose immediately sprang into action and helped start an organization called The Mutual Concerns Committee. It consists of a board and many volunteers, who, through the years, have met the short and long-term needs of those in need. Local organizations, businesses, schools and individuals support this 501(c)(3) charitable group with financial contributions and food drives. Eventually the MCC expanded to help all those within the North Shore

There are two ways to cut that cost: recycle or compost waste, rather than throw it in the garbage. Recycling costs approximately 1/3 of the cost of garbage disposal, composting is free. The ECC will be offering composters for sale at Springfest on June 11th. Please stop by our table to purchase a composter and to talk about composting and recycling, as well as other ways to make Sea Cliff greener.

The Village has single stream recycling where all recyclables can be thrown together in one bin and left out for pickup on Wednesday mornings. The following items can be recycled:

- · Aluminum: cans, foil, pie plates, food containers. Please
- · Books: paperbacks, hardcovers & textbooks w/ the hard covers removed.
- · Cardboard: All corrugated boxes, egg containers, food boxes from cereal or frozen food. Please remove Styrofoam™, plastic and other packing materials.
- · Glass containers: bottles, jars (brown, clear or green). Please rinse clean.
- · Mail: Junk mail, catalogs, cards, magazines & all types of paper envelopes.
- Metal: all types of metal (ex-

cept mercury) including food & beverage containers, steel

- Paper: All colors and types.
- Plastic containers: #1-7 all types, including from food & beverage, medicine, cleaning products, including lids and caps. Please rinse clean.
- · Rigid plastics: including crates, lawn furniture, laundry baskets, garbage cans, coolers, flower pots, plastic drums.
- · Spray cans: Empty aerosol

Clean Boating Tips

Undoubtedly, one of the pleasures of living on Long Island in the summer is being able to spend time on our boats - fishing, enjoying sunsets, or simply getting away from the hustle and bustle. If we are lucky, we will once again be able to see humpback whales, Peregrine falcons, seals, bald eagles, diamondback terrapins, and other creatures that have returned now that water quality and habitat areas have been improved or been restored.

Water quality and enjoyment of the water are directly related. And water quality and taking personal responsibility to protect it are also directly related. This article will provide some guidance to boaters on steps to take to protect our waters.

Maintenance: When scraping the bottom of your boat, place a tarp under the area being worked on and use vacuum sanders and grinders. Try to use non-phosphate, biodegradable cleansers or plain water. The chemicals contained in many boat cleaners can kill or harm fish and other aquatic creatures. When done, sweep up and dispose of the scrapings, rather than hosing it down. Recycle your used motor oil. A free disposal tank for this purpose is located at Tappen Beach. Bottom paint can contain toxic metals that work their way through the aquatic food chain and greatly increase the cost for maintenance dredging of marinas and waterways.

Fueling: When fueling, do not top off your tank. Fuel expands as temperatures rise, so fill the tank to 90%. Also, unlike automobiles, dockside gas pumps do not automatically shut off when tanks are full. One simple and inexpensive option is to install a "fuel whistle" or similar device on your fuel line. When the tank approaches the full mark, the air in the line "whistles" to tell you to stop. You should also install an absorbent "bilge sock" in your bilge to absorb any oils, gas, and power steering fluids that may leak into the bilge. As little as a quart of oil or gasoline can contaminate up to 250,000 gallons of water.

Pumpouts: All of Long Island Sound and all of its bays and harbors are designated as a Vessel Waste No Discharge Zone. Use dockside pumpout stations or pumpout boats operated by the Town of North Hempstead or Town of Oyster Bay. Sewage disposed of in the water can lead to elevated bacteria and nitrogen levels that can cause beach and shellfish closures and algae blooms and fish kills. The US EPA reports that a single weekend boater flushing untreated sewage into our waters produces the same amount of bacterial pollution as 10,000 people whose sewage passes through a sewage treatment plant.

Invasive Species: When moving your boat from one waterbody to another, inspect and remove all visible mud, plants, fish and animals from the boat and trailer, clothing, pets, fishing gear and other equipment and dispose of this debris in a sealed plastic bag on land. Invasive species can wreak havoc on ecosystems and wastewater treatment plants and are extremely difficult to control once introduced.

Waste Disposal: Just as you do at home, properly dispose of and recycle your waste, being especially careful with plastics which some marine animals mistake for food and which can clog their digestive systems. The Center for Marine Conservation reports that plastics account for more than 50% of all marine debris.

If you fish, also pay attention to your monofilament fishing line and six pack rings. Both the Town of North Hempstead and Town of Oyster Bay have monofilament recycling receptacles. Studies have shown that more than 267 species of marine organisms have been known to ingest or become entangled in marine debris that enters the


