The Annual Organizational Meeting of the Incorporated Village of Sea Cliff

On Monday, April 16th, the Board of Trustees met with the public to conduct their annual organizational meeting. A full house was in attendance as Mayor Ed Lieberman and Boy Scout Troop 43 presented the colors and led the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by an invocation by Reverend David Collins. Mayor Lieberman thanked outgoing Trustee Robin Maynard for her valuable contribution to the board and noted that she will continue to serve as a volunteer in the community. The Mayor then offered congratulations to reelected Village Trustee Kevin McGilloway and newly elected Village Trustee Henriette Rohl and administered their oaths of office. Both will serve two-year terms. The Mayor also welcomed the newly elected Village Justice, Charles Parisi, for a term of four years and administered his oath of office.

The meeting continued as the Mayor delivered his State of the Village Address. Noting that this

is the Village's 135th anniversary of incorporation, he described it as "a shining gem." With gratitude, he acknowledged his wife, Kathy, and the Village pillars of support: the Fire Department, the staff at Village Hall, and the Department of Public Works. The Mayor reviewed Village initiatives illustrating his commitment to long term planning: the new Technology Task Force, the live-streaming of public meetings, the estab-

lishment of a Traffic and Safety Commission, the new rules on short term rentals, a moratorium on subdivisions, and the recent ban on plastic shopping bags. The Mayor stated his continued focus on the environment and his interest in following the development at Garvies Point. It has been a successful year, as the Village has secured millions of dollars in grant funding. This is evidenced in the upgrading of *(continued on page 2)*

First Half Village Tax Payments are due June 1, 2018. Taxes may be paid by mail or at the office of the Village Clerk every Monday from 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., and Tuesday through Friday between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., excepting holidays and such other times the Village Hall offices are closed.

When Penalties Apply

On all First Half Taxes paid on or before July 2, 2018, no penalty or interest will be charged. If paid after July 2, 2018, interest will be added monthly or for any fraction thereof until paid at the current rate in effect as set by the State Commissioner of Taxation and Finance as prescribed in subdivision 2 of Section 924-a of the N.Y.S. Real Property Tax Law

Notes From The Village Board

In the past year, many ideas have come before the board including: creating a community center, undertaking traffic studies and traffic calming changes to our roads, maintenance and upgrading of sidewalks, environmental litigation, utility provider litigation, land conservation, a variety of storm water runoff projects, and more. All of these projects are too expensive for the village to simply add to the budget. However, with planning and over time, we can move toward enacting many of these quality of life projects if they prove to be part of our shared vision for the future of Sea Cliff. The village is in a good position to undertake strategic planning: our fiscal ratings are solid, our debt is relatively low, we have some financial reserves, and we have long-term, major projects and associated pressures and changes (nearby development, coming sewer projects, ongoing environmental concerns, complex issues with utility providers) that do not have simple solutions and require forward-looking, strategic planning to manage effectively.

Capital plans, reserve fund plans, and debt management plans are also common tools municipalities use to manage. A strategic plan is different in that it is not specifically about the use or management of money; rather it is intended to be a tangible reflection of a community's spirit and culture, articulating and reinforcing the mutual relationship between citizens and their government. A master plan for a municipality is also different in that a master plan is primarily about land use. A strategic plan is the foundation for these other plans, like when you go to your financial planner and she asks what your goals are-do you want to save for your children's college costs, for retirement, a second home, or other goals. You get your priorities set out then you work on plans to achieve them. That's what this strategic plan is about—having conversations throughout the village about what our priorities and goals are as a community, articulating, sharing, and building consensus around what is most important to us going forward.

A high quality, inclusively created strategic plan is much more than a road map to the future. A plan articulates objectives, targets, and ways to monitor and measure progress, which establishes ongoing accountability while providing a management tool that balances daily operations with longterm objectives. Engaging not only citizens on boards and committees but welcoming input from all citizens interested participating increases civic engagement and drives government responsiveness to citizens. I am committed to making the process for engaging

and hearing from you as open and collaborative as possible. Reflecting on our shared values, envisioning our collective future and collaborating on how we will move forward together will be substantial work. We have many voices and points of view in our community and this is also a process of hearing, understanding, and weaving them all together—critical work for the future of an engaged, connected, and satisfying community.

It makes sense to start with just looking five years into the future (perhaps, once we have solid five-year plans, we can consider more longrange planning). The process we go through to build a plan will have multiple steps and seek input and insight from all citizens. To create a villagewide plan, we will work with each committee and board in the village government. We will also survey our general population and hold meetings specifically to hear from all of you. These pieces will inform the overall, village-wide plan. That top-level plan will be a substantial piece of work itself. Trustee McGilloway will work with me organizing this effort. Sea Cliff Street Names

The Sea Cliff Village Museum will be opening on October 12 with our new exhibit 1883—the Birth of a Village. Until then, a stroll through the village will reveal the scenic and diverse assortment of Sea Cliff's streets that have honored early settlers and renowned citizens of the past. Here are a few of their names and origins:

Ransom Avenue: Named for Charles Ransom, the street was changed from Geissenhainer in the 1930s. Mr. Geissenhainer was the first president of Sea Cliff, and Mr. Ransom was the village historian who authored Gaslight and Gingerbread.

Harriet Court: Harriet Cohen's family owned a large piece of property in this area. When the land was developed, the street was named for their daughter.

Berkley Place: At a village board meeting in the late 1940s, Dr. Morris, a local dentist, suggested his grandson's name, Berkley, for the street name.

Marden Avenue: Marden Farm was located on the site of North Shore Acres. Marden Avenue was named after Orison Swett Marden,

Cromwell Place: In the area of the present Cromwell Avenue, a farm owned by the Cromwell family stood.

Littleworth Lane: The Littleworth tract of land was confirmed by the Mosketo Cove proprietors in 1681. The land was an old Indian trail, which led cross-country from the harbor to Oyster Bay.

Sheridan Lane: This name was chosen by Edythe Snyder, who was married to Theodore Sheridan's grandson. Commodore Sheridan started the Sea Cliff Yacht Club in the early 1890s.

Carpenter Ave: Carpenter is a name which has been associated with Sea Cliff since its

earliest days. In 1668, Joseph Carpenter purchased most of the land the village occupies from the native inhabitants. His title to the land was confirmed in 1667 by the "Mosketo Cove Patent" granted by the British Governor of New York. In 1871, the Metropolitan Campground Association purchased land from the descendants of James Carpenter.

Tilley Place: The Tilley family owned a bathhouse and pavilion. Arthur Tilley was the first person to hold the title of mayor. Former office holders were known as "president."

Coalition to Save Hempstead Harbor

Winter has finally left our shores, and CSHH is gearing up for another busy season! We started the spring off with a much-needed cleanup of Scudder's Pond on April 21. Unfortunately, winter storms and the fun afternoons spent skating on the pond left a trail of trash. Thank you to all the volunteers and the residents around the pond for helping coordinate a very successful cleanup. In an ongoing effort, we ask everyone to help pick up trash whenever you can. Every bit of trash collected will not only help keep our streets, beaches, harbor, and pond clean, but also protect marine life and other wildlife from the hazards that plastic and other debris create for them.

The two summer-season water-monitoring programs that CSHH coordinates run from May through the end of October. The CSHH monitoring crew is out bright and early testing the waters weekly at up to twentytwo stations around Hempstead Harbor and in Glen Cove Creek. The data collected during these programs are instrumental in assessing the ecological health of the harbor as well as in addressing obstacles to continued water-quality improvements. The water-monitoring program has supported, for example, the restoration of Scudder's Pond

and continues to track whether improvements to the pond have been successful in decreasing bacteria loading to the harbor. The bacteria data collected at other stations within the harbor help complement the work of the Nassau County Department of Health in assessing conditions at all of the beaches around the harbor. In addition, data collected at the "powerhouse drain" will support the anticipated work in Glenwood Landing that will that will be necessary to decrease bacteria loading to the harbor. (The powerhouse drain—the large outfall at the bottom of the hill at Glenwood Road and Shore Road-was determined to be the secondlargest contributor of bacteria to Hempstead Harbor; prior to the restoration, Scudder's Pond was the largest contributor.) To further support future work in Glenwood Landing, CSHH will begin a unique habitat-restoration project involving ten area homeowners who will assist in planting native plants that will be selected to most effectively reduce runoff from their properties and decrease nitrogen. The homeowners will participate in workshops and learn how to monitor results from the new plantings. Check our website at www.coalitiontosavehemp-

Healthy Lawns And Clean Water—We Can Have Both!

You've probably heard by now (at least I hope!) that applying too much fertilizer to your lawn can cause problems in our groundwater as well as in our harbors and bays. We all love green lawns and we all want clean water. The truth is that we can have both, and it is not too hard to achieve.

Computer modeling on Hempstead Harbor by The Nature Conservancy has shown that 15-20 percent of the nitrogen in our harbor is attributable to fertilizer use. If it is in the harbor, that means that more fertilizer was applied than the grass or plants could take up. If the grass cannot take up the fertilizer, it can percolate down into the groundwater (which ultimately flows into the harbor in our area) or during rainstorms it can be washed into the street and into storm drains which empty in our waterways. Once in the harbor, it does what fertilizer does and promotes plant growth for things like algae. The algae then dies off and in the process consumes oxygen, which leads to a condition known as "hypoxia" (meaning "low oxygen")

that can cause fish kills and other problems.

The timing and quantity are the two most important things that you have to consider. Between November and April, grass does not actively grow, so fertilizer applications will not be beneficial.

The best times to fertilize are April through June and September through October. Check the weather and do not apply it when heavy rainfall is forecast. Individual applications of nitrogen should not exceed one pound per thousand square feet and should total no more than 2–3 pounds of nitrogen per thousand square feet per year. LIGHTLY water in the fertilizer after applying it. Make sure to sweep up any fertilizer that may land on driveways or sidewalks to prevent it from reaching

You should also know that since 2009, it has been illegal in Nassau County to apply fertilizer to turf areas between November 15th and April 1st. It is okay, however, to apply compost or unaltered animal manures. Also, since 2012, New York State has

banned the use of phosphorous in lawn fertilizers except in limited circumstances.

Other tips are: Mow high—three inches or taller. This encourages roots to forage deeply for water and nutrients. Leave clippings on the lawn—they will add nutrients to your soil, reducing your fertilizing needs. A mulching mower makes this even easier. On average, lawns need about one inch of water a week from rainfall or irrigation. Overwatering can leach nutrients into the groundwater.

As this article is being written, a new state law has been proposed (A10276 / S08170) that would require lawn fertilizers used or sold on Long Island to contain a minimum of 50 percent water insoluble nitrogen, and limit total nitrogen to no more than 12 percent by weight. It is uncertain as to whether this will pass, but this bill appears to have a chance of doing so.

The Sea Cliff Gardener

Plant!!! We are now well into the season where the typical gardener/homeowner is well into mowing, weeding, and planting. Plant almost everything except the really cold weather vegetables. As your veggies and herbs are harvested, use succession planting and sow another crop. You can sow two to three crops of some herbs and veggies, such as lettuce and basil. This depends on the growing length of what you are planting. Your best guidance will come from the back of the seed packages, so read what your plants will need, their growth period, and if there can be a second crop.

Rain barrels are a great way to conserve water. Buy one on sale (as most garden centers now have them), hook it up, and store water for watering. You can either add plastic piping or just put the water in your watering can. It is an opportunity to conserve and cut down your water bill. Other sources of "recycled" water include the dog dish, water from cooked vegetables, and water from glasses that were only partially consumed. Do not water plants with any liquid that contains chemicals or additives (sugar and alcohol for example). There is no reason "used" water cannot be recycled, as this water only adds to our cesspools. If you do not have potted plants, sprinkle it on the bush outside of your door.

June 30 is Sea Cliff's own Garden Tour. This is hosted by the Sea Cliff Beautification Committee, and I am sure it will be wonderful as always. On July 21 there will be the Long Island Wildflowers talk and garden walk from 1-3 p.m. at Garvies Point Museum. Also, August 4th is Garvies Point Museum Day, and there will be guided tours of the native butterfly- and bird-friendly gardens from 10-4. This is also the season for farmers' markets. Local markets include Winter's Edge Micro Farm on Dubois Avenue and the Sea Cliff Market at St. Luke's Church on Glen Avenue. Both organic markets are on Saturdays into the autumn.

Be considerate of your neighbors by backing off all plantings from their property line. That small bush you are planting will one day grow and overhang adjacent property lines, creating limited use of your neighbor's property as well as a maintenance headache. It is your neighbor's right to cut trees, bushes, etc. to the property line. Newer plantings should be planted with your neighbor in mind and backed off the property line.


